Dixon's "Dream Houses": Bay Area sculptor Randy Dixon has one terrific piece and several also-rans on view in the Oakland Museum's City Center Sculpture Court.

Scale sets the successful piece apart in more than just dimensions. "Two Doors on Night's Edge" (2005) folds two full-size, hardware-fitted doors into an eccentric structure of floorboards and corrugated metal.

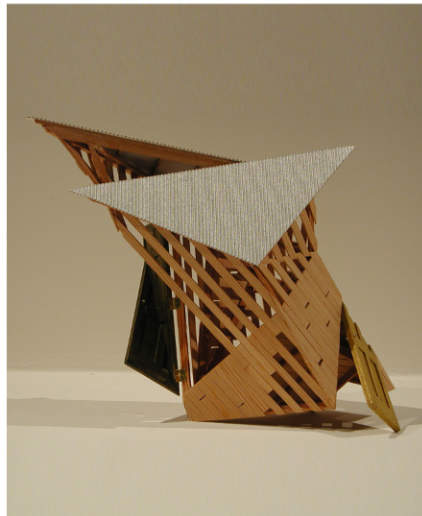
The eccentric angular geometry of "Two Doors" makes the piece look as if it might translate, faithfully, a passage from some forgotten cubist-influence picture. The floorboards and slats, the doors and their knobs all awaken the habitual knowledge of such things submerg-ed in the viewer's body.

Dixon calls his pieces "Dream Houses," and they do suggest a search for a sculptural equivalent of the way the dreams form themselves in all their oddity from the body's memory of intentional acts in familiar environments. "Two Doors" elicits physical fears of entrapment, disorientation and loss of control because its scale makes bodily response irresistible. One's imagination looks for footholds and hand holds in the piece, nevermind the flanking "Do Not Touch" signs.

We might even see a satire of contemporary architecture's striving for stylishness in Dixon's work.

But the smaller works on view, though they display the same expert cabinetry skills as the centerpiece, read as maquettes rather than fully-realized sculptures. We may hope they are.

ART AND ARCHITECTURE

The work of Bay Area artist Randy Dixon can give you a different perspective on the city you walk through every day. Take, for example, his sculpture “Two Doors on Night’s Edge.” It’s a bold, aggressive, 14-foot-tall wood construction that juts forward and out, as if it wants to get to the future now.

It also bears a strong resemblance to the jut in glass facade of the new San Joaquin County administration building under construction in downtown Stockton. Compare the two, and you might find a new appreciation for the spirit of the courthouse architecture.

And that’s what great art should do. It should change how you look at the world around you.

See if you gain a new perspective by checking out Dixon’s sculpture as part of “Architecture in Art,” an exhibition this month at San Joaquin Delta College’s Horton Gallery. The show continues through Feb. 11 and also features the work of Thomas Morphis.

Dixon and Morphis' art at Horton Gallery

The LH Horton Jr Gallery showcased the art of Randy Dixon and Thomas Morphis this past month in a show entitled, "Architecture in Art."

Though both artists work in different mediums, Dixon working sculpturally while Morphis working with mixed media, they share common architectural elements.

Dixon, an experienced architect, creates abstract architecture while utilizing familiar artifacts in miniature proportions.

Much of Dixon's art is geometric in shape and symmetrical, while augmenting common ideas or tools for new purposes.

There is a certain irrationality behind his work, in which objects that are easily recognizable are oriented and skewed into illogical forms.

The attention to detail and craftsmanship in Dixon's sculptures is exquisite and visually stunning.

Morphis works in mixed media, oftentimes using watercolors, acrylics, collage work, and found objects that are set in resin.

Each of Morphis' paintings is presented in resin layers, giving his art a three-dimensional quality with tiny traces of real shadows.

Much of his work incorporates elements of architecture, whether collages of blueprints are mixed into the art or lines are drawn into structural patterns.

His work is thought provoking and evokes feelings of complacency and hope.

Both artists' works will be on display at the Horton gallery through Feb. 11.
